CHANGES TO THE WMMC YEARBOOK

The 2022-2023 Yearbooks will be handed out to members at the Spring Luncheon and also at the Fall Luncheon for those unable to attend in the spring.

There have been a few major changes to the yearbook this year that appear to have the support of the membership as it was expressed in the recent survey sent to all members via email.

The biggest and most exciting change is the creation of a SUPPLEMENTAL publication of the programs. The programs will no longer be in the yearbook. This supplemental will be distributed in the fall.

There are several upsides to this new publication. It allows the program committee more time to schedule and book performers, it allows for the program to be distributed to not only the members of the club but also guests who attend the meetings, and it addresses an important "Know the Show in advance" issue for the membership, performers and leaders of each program.

The program will also continue to be listed on the WMMC website.

Other changes include the removal of many of the upper level contact information from the National, State, District and Affiliate organizations. The Survey indicated that only a handful of people found this information useful.

The areas that the members indicated they valued the most will remain: the history of the club, the phone directory, the WMMC Board members and committees, the award winners and contributors, and the bylaws.

There were 96 total members of the club at the time the survey was taken. Of those 33% of the club members responded to the survey. This represents a statistically meaningful sample.


