Bonnie Cummins Fielder Vocal Career Advancement Grant

The finals of the Bonnie Cummins Fielder Vocal Career Advancement Grant were held Wednesday, March 15, at the First Unitarian Universalist Church. Established in 2005 by Bonnie Fielder, the grant has supported more than thirty winners along their career paths in the very competitive, yet under resourced field of vocal performance. A total of \$12,000 was awarded.

This year's winners were chosen from a highly competitive field of applicants by the club's selection committee: Sue Bilich, Fran Rush, Deborah Scott Hammonds, Katharine Shields and Mollie Tower. The judges were Darlene Wiley (retired, University of Texas Austin) and Suzanne Ramo, (Texas State University). Maimy Fong accompanied all of the young artists.

First place was awarded to **KATHLEEN FELTY**, a mezzo-soprano, who holds a Master's in Vocal Performance from the A.J. Fletcher Opera Institute of UNCSA. She recently performed the role of Mercédès in *Carmen* with the Santa Fe Opera. She performed **Mon cœur s'ouvre à ta voix** from *Samson and Delilah* by Camille Saint-Saëns and **Mio Fernando** from Donizetti's *La Favorita*.

Second place was presented to **SARA KENNEDY**, a soprano, who holds a Graduate Artist's Certificate in Opera from the University of North Texas. This summer she will be performing the role of Donna Anna in Mozart's *Don Giovanni* with the Camerata Bardi Vocal Academy. She presented **Mercè**, **dilette amiche** from *I vespri siciliani* by Guiseppe Verdi and an additional selection.

Third place was a tie between SARAH DYER and BREE NICHOLS. Ms. Dyer, a mezzo-soprano is currently completing her certificate of Vocal Performance at the University of Houston. She recently performed the role of Madame Larina in *Eugene Onegin* at the Music Academy of the West. She offered Hence Iris, Hence Away from G.F. Handel's *Semele* and Der Tod und das Mädchen by Franz Schubert.

Ms. Nichols, a soprano, was a postdoctoral Fulbright grantee to the Czech Republic in 2021-22 where she prepared for the release of her debut solo album *Pure Morning*, a celebration of Czech Opera and art song. She is also the founder of Opera Arlington, an organization created to inspire the Dallas—Fort Worth area through opera while encouraging young singers. She presented **The Jewel Song** from Charles Gounod's *Faust* and an additional selection.

The audience felt very privileged to hear what were truly virtuosic performances. Music Club Austin (through the auspices of Bonnie's grant) is proud to have played a part in advancing the careers of these exceptional artists. We hope to keep in touch with them and track their future successes in the world of classical music.

Failure to perform or get a substitute was deemed a one dollar fine; absence was 25 cents, and tardiness 10 cents.

We have no fines now, but we do have a membership who willingly and eagerly volunteer their talent and skills to keep this club running smoothly. So the dues we pay is also a

way we give voice to our gratitude for what they do. After the excellent coordination of the Fielder and high school awards competition in March, watching the great work of our Centennial Committee as they put together a fitting celebration for our 100^{th} year, realizing the effort that goes into producing our monthly newsletter and maintaining our website — and that's just the beginning of long, long list — I am thankful to be surrounded by members and club leaders who give so unselfishly of their service and time to keep this club running smoothly.

On this centennial year I am grateful for all those members who have served this club in the past, those who are serving now, and those who will continue to honor the great legacy of Music Club Austin/Wednesday Morning Music Club by serving in the future.

A book called "Symphony for Simple Simon" was written by the Durrum twins and illustrated by Betsy Warren in the 1960s. It explained the instruments of the orchestra and was sold as a fundraiser, earning \$19.15. (According to a quick search online, it is no longer available.)

A metal filing cabinet was purchased in the 1960s to hold club music. After we left the Texas Federated Women's Club building in 2017-18, the music was donated




